## **Culinary Selected to Assist Clinton Library Opening**

After being contacted by a catering company from Tulsa, Oklahoma, Ozarka College Culinary and Hospitality Instructor, Chef Richard Tankersley along with Ozarka's culinary students will be a part of the Bill Clinton Library Grand Opening next month.

The weeklong event which will be one of largest to take place in Arkansas history is set for November 14-18. The library is located within a 27-acre park on the south bank of the Arkansas River in the River Market District of downtown Little Rock. The \$160-million-dollar structure will contain 20,000 square feet of library and museum space, to include a replica of the Oval Office and the Cabinet Room.

Not only will the event be one of Clinton's first public appearances since his open heart surgery, President and First Lady Bush are expected to attend, as well as other former Presidents, celebrities and foreign dignitaries, according to the event planners.

One feature of the Clinton Library will be *Café* 42, named for Clinton being the 42<sup>nd</sup> President. *The Catering Connection* from Tulsa, Oklahoma has been chosen to run *Café* 42 out of more than fifty applicants. In preparation for the Grand Opening events in November, Quentin Turner and John Koontz of *The Catering Connection* began searching for skilled, professional people in Arkansas to assist with the undertaking.

"After hearing about the Culinary Arts Program at Ozarka, I received a phone call from Mr. Turner last month" states Tankersley. "This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the students and the culinary program to be a part of this historical event for the State of Arkansas." Including Tankersley, twenty-three from the culinary department will be a part of the experience next month.

#### 2nd CCOT COURSE AVAILABLE 11/2

Ozarka College will offer a course in child care orientation training (CCOT) from November 2nd through November 23<sup>rd</sup> at the main campus in Melbourne. This training is being offered in partnership with the Division of Child Care and Early Childhood Education of the Arkansas Department of Human Services and the University of Arkansas.

Childcare givers can receive this quality training at *no cost* due to a grant from the University of Arkansas. In addition to the training, students will benefit from the interaction with other caregivers and will be eligible to receive a certificate of completion. Graduates from the CCOT course are also eligible to apply for Child Development scholarships applicable for further training offered by Ozarka College next Spring.

Classes begin on Tuesday, November 2, at 5 p.m. and will meet until 8 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday evenings through November 23. Amy Pinkston, Director of Ozarka Kids Academy, will be the instructor for the CCOT course.

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### **Dave's Arbor Advice**

Ozarka's Landscaper, Dave Rush shares his advice this month on planting new trees.

He says there are three ways to purchase trees: bare root, burlap ball, or containerized. "If planting a bare root tree, always plant them when they are dormant and if buying a tree with the burlap ball, cut the wire away from the trunk before planting."

The first step and one of the most important is preparing the hole where the tree will be planted. Dave recommends the hole to be two to three times bigger than the container, ball or root.

If it is dry, pour about five gallons of water into the hole before putting in the tree. He adds that if the tree is being placed where dirt is not of very good quality, add some good soil. Next, when placing the tree in the ground, do not cover the crown of the root ball too much with dirt or mulch. "No more than two inches," he adds.

Another very important step in planting new trees is to place mulch around the tree to the drip line. The drip line is described as the place where water hits the ground from dripping off the branches of the tree.

This step will help keep weeds and turf from growing around the perimeter of the tree. "This is so important because if there is turf and weeds growing, they will take nutrients from the soil that the root of tree needs for healthy growth."

The last precautionary step is to place a border or barrier to the drip line around the newly planted tree. This helps in keeping from having to mow and weed eat up to the trunk of the tree.
