# James F. Fenton

Ozarka College lost a valuable member of its family on October 12, 2005. James F. Fenton was hired by Ozarka College in October of 2001 as the first Development Officer for the college through the Title III Grant. Fenton and his wife, Irene had moved to Cherokee Village from the State of Iowa and Fenton brought to Ozarka years of experience in education.

In Fenton's memory of his love for education and dedication to the students of Ozarka College, his family has established a scholarship in his name through the Ozarka College endowment. With a scholarship through the endowment, not only will the Title III grant match any money dollar for dollar, but it will allow Fenton's legacy to continue for many years to come, by helping Ozarka students with a financial need.

Prior to his move to Arkansas, Jim worked in many different aspects of education in Iowa. He was a coach, teacher and administrator. Jim was a pioneer in the field of alternative education in the State of Iowa and on September 9th of this year, the Iowa Association of Alternative Education renamed their Lifetime Achievement Award the "Jim Fenton Lifetime Achievement Award." This honor is given to an individual each year at their Statewide Conference.

While at Ozarka, Jim was instrumental in raising funds for a science lab located in the new facility at Ash Flat. He oversaw the construction of that new 16,000 foot facility and was very involved with the students attending Ozarka at Ash Flat. He knew the value of education and wanted to see each and every one succeed. He also worked closely with the Foundation Board and his community.

Irene Fenton has established eligibility requirements for this scholarship in honor of Jim's connection to alterna-

tive education as well as his regard for believing that any student can succeed with the proper motivation and financial means. Once fully funded, preference will be given to applicants involved with alternative education. Otherwise, the criteria will be fulltime enrollment, have a financial need, but not necessarily qualify for federal grants or other academic scholarships. The scholarship will be available to cover tuition, books or other Ozarka related fees for renewal for up to three semesters as long as the student maintains a reasonable grade point average and remains enrolled at fulltime status.

The Ozarka Foundation is a 501(c) 3 organization and all donations are tax deductible on itemized tax forms. Anyone interested in making a donation to this endowed scholarship in honor of James F. ## **Ozarka Adopts Family From Gulf Coast**

Ozarka College has adopted a family who was devastated by Hurricane Katrina. Dr. Ed Franklin of the Arkansas Association of Two Year Colleges (AATYC) arranged for all 22 two year colleges in the State of Arkansas to "adopt" a family from Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College (MGCCC), which has sites located all along the devastated gulf coast. MGCCC gave the names of the 22 employees who had suffered the most extensive losses from the hurricane.

Ozarka College selected the Ralph King family of Waveland, Mississippi. Ralph is an instructor for Local Area Networking Technology and he and his family lost their home which floated off of its foundation and into the street during the heavy flooding that was associated with Katrina and lost most of their belongings.

Ozarka's Director of Planning and Special Projects, Joan Stirling, has coordinated this project for Ozarka and has been in communication with King. She states, "Mr. King and his wife, Stella and their two sons have been reluctant to take donations and said that they were thankful to be so much better off than many of the people along the Gulf because he still has a place to go to work." the twenty-two Arkansas two year colleges adopting twenty-two families from MGCCC came about and asked King to make a wish list of items that he and his family lost and Ozarka would go to work to try to provide those items. "King obliged and with the generosity of Ozarka's employees he and his family will have each and every item on their 'wish list,' which mostly consisted of household items and tools," added Stirling.

Ozarka is now in the process delivering the items to Ralph and his family in Mississippi. "King said they were so much better off than many of the people along the Gulf because he still has a place to go to work."

### **Ozarka Continuing Ed Offering CPR Certification**

The Ozarka College Continuing Education Department will be offering two CPR certification classes in the next few weeks. On Tuesday, November 29, Ozarka will offer an adult CPR certification class, and on Tuesday, December 6, Ozarka will offer an infant and child CPR certification class. Each four hour course will take place from 6-10PM. Karen Martin, who has been an American Red Cross CPR instructor for more than 25 years, will instruct the courses and an American Red Cross certificate will be issued to those completing the requirements for the courses.

These CPR courses will provide instruction in how to recognize and respond to an emergency and provide emergency care in rescue breathing, CPR and first aid for choking for adults and/or infants and children. Students will be taught using a multi-media approach incorporating use of videos, lecture and hands-on training using CPR manikins.

According to Martin, who is also Ozarka's Physical Education instructor, "these classes are not only useful to people who interested in a health related career, such as nursing, home health or paramedics, but they are valuable to anyone who would like to know how to respond in an emergency situation that might arise at home or anyplace else."
